

EPISTLE (Acts 5:12-20)

A reading from the Acts of the Holy Apostles:

In those days, many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the apostles. They were all together in Solomon's portico. None of the others dared to join them, but the people esteemed them. Yet more than ever, believers in the Lord, great numbers of men and women, were added to them. Thus they even carried the sick out into the streets and laid them on cots and mats so that when Peter came by, at least his shadow might fall on one or another of them. A large number of people from the towns in the vicinity of Jerusalem also gathered, bringing the sick and those disturbed by unclean spirits, and they were all cured. Then the high priest rose up and all his companions, that is, the party of the Sadducees, and, filled with jealousy, laid hands upon the apostles and put them in the public jail. But during the night, the angel of the Lord opened the doors of the prison, led them out, and said, "Go and take your place in the temple area, and tell the people everything about this life."

Gospel: (Jn 20:19-31)

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. [Jesus] said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail marks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of [his] disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may [come to] believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

THE PASCHA OR PASSOVER OF CHRIST

The word "Pascha" is derived from the Hebrew word "pesach", which means to pass by or to pass through. Yahweh God had desired to deliver His Chosen People from their bondage of slavery in Egypt. In the Book of Exodus 5:1, we read how Moses and Aaron went to Pharaoh saying: "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel: Let my people go, that they may hold a feast* for me in the wilderness." (Exodus 5:1) When Pharaoh refused to grant this request, God sent an angel of death. In the Book of Exodus 12:11-13: "It is the LORD's Passover. For on this same night I will go through Egypt, striking down every firstborn in the land, human being and beast alike, and executing judgment on all the gods of Egypt—I, the LORD! But for you the blood will mark the houses where you are. Seeing the blood, I will pass over you; thereby, when I strike the land of Egypt, no destructive blow will come upon you." The angel of death was sent to take the lives of the Egyptian first-born. Our Catechism, Christ Our Pascha, explains that the angel of death passed by Israelite homes: "the door-posts of which by the direction of Moses had been anointed with the blood of a sacrificed lamb, so that no Hebrew child would die (see Exodus 12:12-13). The Jewish celebration of Passover is also a commemoration of the Israelites passing through the Red Sea. (Exodus 14) God saved the Israelites fleeing from the pursuit of Pharaoh. The Christian understanding of Christ as Pascha is that He had conquered death by His death and new life came forth, an eternal life. Christ passed through suffering and death to "His glorification in the Resurrection and Ascension." (Catechism, Christ Our Pascha, 215) During Resurrection Matins, we sing: "Pascha, Pascha of the Lord, for from death to life, from earth to Heaven, Christ has led us." (Canon, Ode 1, Irmos) We proclaim that Jesus Christ Himself is Our Pascha. Without Christ, there would be no liberation from the terrible powers of sin, death, and all forms of evil. The Old Testament Passover was a prefiguration of Christ's Passover. The Old Testament Passover prepared the Chosen People for final and ultimate liberation and salvation. Christ the Lamb of God, the Totally Innocent One, shed His Blood to deliver mankind from sin. Christ Our Redeemer took upon Him the sin of the world. The Lord is long-suffering. He willingly accepts death. Christ conquered death by death. And His Resurrection from the dead has become our passageway to new life, eternal life in the Heavenly Kingdom. From the time of our Baptism, we have put on Christ, beginning to walk in the footsteps of Christ. St. Paul in his epistles speaks about the Christ life in terms of "dying and rising with Christ." In Baptism, we have died to sin and rose to new life, a life of grace. But the Christian also throughout his or her lifetime continue to grow closer to Christ, to put off the old self and put on the new. We are called to die or put off any sinful inclination and selfishness and to rise or increase in virtue. And our death is a future event that we prepare to receive in spirit of Christ, which is one of Love and truth. Haven died in and which Christ, our eternal life will be much of the same-living for all eternity in Heaven with

Alleluia verses:

Come, let us sing joyfully to the Lord, let us acclaim God, our Savior. For God is the great Lord and the great king over all the earth.
